CTE Webinar

Acting together for Racial Justice

Black Lives Matter has challenged Christians about our role and shortcomings

in confronting racism. Can we now help one another in taking positive action?
Three things are needed: recognition, lament and education. That's the conclusion of Keyboard who make connections in Bristol between black churches, and white-led churches, meeting



together and meeting separately. This was shared in an online event about racial justice, hosted by Churches Together in England.

Another key insight was that white Christians should not be looking to BAME Christians to help them, and to have to relive all over again the pain of repeated microagression that black people today are on the receiving end of. There is already quite enough documented about the issues, and resolutions passed. It's now about action.

We'd love to hear from Christians in the CTMR area who are taking action or wanting to, in however small a way, in solidarity, personal contact, righting wrongs, in employment and institutions.

CTMR could offer a space where people can meet, or share hopes, or create a reading group. Things we couldn't do on our own become possible when we connect with others.

The 'All Ecumenical Officers Conference'

A Meeting of CTE with NW Church Leaders

took place last week entitled Re-imagining Intermediate Ecumenism. A representative from each of the 5 areas in the North West gave a brief introduc-



tion to the 36 participants about how they work ecumenically in their region. The report from Merseyside highlighted that at present ecumenism focuses on being light footed and missional in this region. We are reaching out to parts of the Church that are not so well represented and

there are good relationship between Church Leaders and Civic Society. It emerged strongly from this meeting that good relationships are at the heart of ecumenism and enable us to listen to God and to one another. Our colleagues from CTE were uplifted by this zoom gathering.

Northern Ecumenical Officers

Colleagues from the North East, West Yorkshire, Cumbria, Cheshire, Lanca-

shire and Greater Manchester continue to meet now via zoom on a quarterly basis for mutual support and sharing. It is very valuable to meet colleagues from across the North and to experience the warmth of relationships.

CTMR Church Leaders group



CTMR Church Leaders met 5 times in 2020 mostly via zoom and continue to give direction to the work of CTMR. Their annual retreat was postponed to a time when it's possible again to meet face to face. CTMR Church Leaders continue to rotate the chair of their meetings.

CTMR Management Council

There is a new CTMR Management Council in place with a smaller number of trustees appointed by the Church Leaders. The membership of this group is based on operational skills rather than denominational representation so as to take ahead practical matters concerning CTMR as a charity and providing support to the Ecumenical Co-ordinator.

Partnering with other Christians where you are?

Maybe you're working with Christians of other traditions on a particular project, or you're finding that you are planning or praying or dreaming together, and you may be wondering how to take the next steps. At what point do you need to put something on paper? What would be appropriate for you? What will strengthen your partnership at this stage? Who do you need to

talk to? Are there others doing something like this?

Churches Together in England have created A Flexible Framework for Local Unity in Mission which helps with questions like this. We've been involved hands on with putting together the **toolkit** that goes with this. Please get in touch, and we'll do everything we can to help.

And we love to hear stories about the joys and struggles, and as far as possible to help problem solve together – we always want to be finding the way to answer questions, "Yes, you can".

Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Around our region there are over twenty worshipping congregations, bringing together different traditions. These LEPs (Local Ecumenical Partnerships) have a formal written agreement affecting the ministry, congregational life, buildings and/or mission projects of more than one denomination, with authorization by the appropriate denominational authorities and the registration of the agreement with CTMR.

LEPs open up opportunities for sharing resources and mission initiatives – they also throw up their own questions and challenges. We're here to offer advice, or point in the direction of others who can.

Support for Asylum Seekers (SAS)

Destitution Project - 2020

If we asked a person seeking asylum or refuge on Merseyside how has their situation changed owing to the current pandemic they would probably list among other things that their access to food, clothes, toilet-



ries has been severely curtailed; their opportunities to meet and socialise with their friends and compatriots have been stopped or restricted and the access to advice and advocacy with their cases has been made more difficult. More especially they would probably say their lack of resources and feelings of hope are having a detrimental effect on their mental wellbeing.

Despite the practical difficulties presented by the pandemic SAS in collaboration with our incredibly resourceful partner agencies have continued to provide practical humanitarian support at a personal level to people seeking asylum and refuge in our local community.

Where possible, activities and social interaction have been made available in order to support their wellbeing and provide hope for the future.

Our main partner agencies include Asylum Link Merseyside, Refugee Women Connect, Faiths4Change and Merseyside Refugee Support Network.

Specifically, SAS has financially supported focused and targeted projects for the destitute including:

Ø At St Michael in the City the former overgrown and derelict garden area around the church has been cleared and a new Community garden is in use by volunteers and visitors and will be developed further in 2021.

The regular support that SAS provides gives "Roots in the City – Community Garden" a reliable source of income – can pay staff & volunteers and buy materials to help grow fresh organic vegetables and herbs for Asylum Seekers and Refugees using the Micah Liverpool food bank at St Brides Church, Liverpool.



Specifically SAS will additionally fund in 2021 pallets of peat compost and the erection of a wooden shelter to provide cover and shade for the volunteers.

Ø Despite having to close St. Anne's Centre for health and security reasons during the pandemic, Asylum Link Merseyside has continued to maintain contact with as many of the destitute as possible. Two houses and two former presbyteries still provide emergency accommodation. Outreach drops provide a lifeline and personal contact with emergency support grants, food parcels, food vouchers, and small cash donations delivered to the hostels or hotels or known addresses for our clients. English as a second language (ESOL) lessons have continued via Zoom meetings, and there have been some restricted outings for students such as bike rides. SAS provided funding for small cash donations to our clients ahead of the recent Christmas break. Ø Refugee Women Connect [formerly MRANG] has adopted innovative ways of maintaining contact during the pandemic by providing emergency support grants to their clients, many with young babies, who for various reasons beyond their control are destitute i.e. no access to public funds or homeless or both.

Ø In 2020 SAS received a request from Merseyside Refugee Support Network [MRSN] to provide practical targeted financial support for their clients while their cases are progressed.

SAS is able to guarantee the current level of support for MRSN and our other partners for the next year. However none of the above projects would be possible without the financial grants and donations received from our



longstanding and generous supporters – individuals, church communities, and faith groups.

Thank you all on behalf of our partner agencies and of course on behalf of the grateful people seeking asylum

and refuge in our community.

Liverpool Seafarers Centre Takes Gifts onto Ship

Liverpool Seafarers

Centre (LSC) as we know it today is the result of a successful partnership between the Anglican Mersey Mission to Seafarers and the Catholic Apostleship of the Sea (Liverpool).

The Centre took Christmas gifts for seafarers on board a vessel docked in Liverpool thanks to Waitrose in Formby. The store got in touch to help, donating mince pies, chocolates, sweets and personal hygiene products to the value of £440. Each seafarer also received a Christmas card handwritten by a Waitrose partner.

LSC chief executive John Wilson took 25 on board the ACL Atlantic Sail and presented them to crew members, who were due to spend Christmas at sea, along with a further 15 to another vessel.

The donation from Waitrose, which already donated surplus food to seafarers via FareShare, was made as part of the John Lewis Partnership Give a Little Love campaign.
