WCC 11th Assembly 31 August – 8 September 2022

The 11th Assembly of the World Council of Churches will take place in Karlsruhe, Germany, from 31 August to 8 September 2022, under the theme "Christ's love moves the world to reconciliation and unity"

The Assembly

is the highest governing body of the World Council of Churches (WCC), and normally meets every eight years. It is the only time when the entire fellowship of member



churches comes together in one place for prayer and celebration.

A WCC Assembly is a special time in the lives of member churches, ecumenical partners and other churches, as it brings together more than 4000 participants, coming from all over the world. It is a unique opportunity for the churches to deepen their commitment to visible unity and common witness. This makes a WCC Assembly the most diverse Christian gathering of its size in the world.

As plans for the assembly take shape, Ioan Sauca said, these plans are undergirded with a feeling of moving forward together. WCC 11th Assembly updates will be published every six weeks through September 2022. Please follow this <u>link</u> for further news and please pray for the assembly.

CTE Presidents—Current and New

CTE is represented by six Presidents from the major traditions of 51 National Member Churches. They meet regularly to discuss matters concerning the Churches in England, and together seek to serve as a sign of our unity. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, and Rev Dr Hugh Osgood the Moderator of the Free Churches Group also hold

this role. The Fourth Presidency is currently not enacted. This follows a request by CTE's Enabling Group in November 2019, reflecting the lack of agreement within the churches in England regarding aspects of theological and moral discernment.

Presidents of CTE expressed their deep gratitude for the service of Archbishop Angaelos and Pastor Agu during this extraordinary period in the life of the Presidency and of CTE more widely. Wider ecumenical engagement in Thy Kingdom Come, wisdom about responses to the COVID pandemic, and especially their leadership in response to the death of George Floyd and the subsequent Black Lives Matter movement, were all priorities 'on their watch.'

About the New CTE Presidents

Archbishop Nikitas of the <u>Ecumenical Patriarchate</u> <u>Archdiocese of Thyateira and the United Kingdom</u> is the new Orthodox President.

He represents the Eastern Orthodox churches which alternate with the Oriental Orthodox churches to nominate a President to represent all Orthodox.

Bishop Tedroy Powell of the <u>Church of God of Proph</u><u>ecy</u> is the new Pentecostal and Charismatic President – having been elected by the Pentecostal and Charismatic Forum within CTE as their next Moderator and President. Photos: CTE

The new Presidents are succeeding Archbishop An-

gaelos of the Coptic Orthodox Diocese of London and Pastor Agu Irukwu, leader of Jesus House RCCG in north London, and until recently the leader of the Redeemed Christian Church of God in the UK.

> They will be joined by another new President in April 2022 – **Rev Helen Cameron, Methodist Chair of the Northampton District** who will be succeeding Rev Dr Hugh Osgood, the current Free Church President and Moderator of the Free Churches Group of which Helen Cameron is the Moderator-elect.

New CTE General Secretary appointed





County Ecumenical Officers (CEOs)

CEOs are appointed ecumenically to support and encourage local ecumenism (churches working together) across a particular county, metropolitan area or large city. Denominational Ecumenical Officers (DEOs)

Partner Churches seek to appoint Denominational Ecumenical Officers to encourage local ecumenism through the Dioceses, District, Synod, Baptist Associations, and Salvation Army Division to work as a team within the area. This team encourages local ecumenism (churches working together), offering advice and resources. 


CTMR Church Leaders Invite Local MPs

Methodists and Anglicans in Upholland



In Upholland the Methodist and Anglican churches are wanting to work as closely as possible in the years ahead, building on joint activities like a café and Alpha groups. They have a vision for doing things together that they couldn't do on their own, making the most of the two strengths of their two "sites", sharing resources in the widest sense. Funding has just been secured from the Methodist Church ONE programme for a full time person for 12 months who will work closely with the Anglican minister who has a pioneering mission role. The vision includes new worshipping congregations, reaching all generations as far as possible, and those on the margins. A working commitment is being drawn up, based on the principles in *A Flexible Framework for Local Unity in Mission* 18.6.2021

questions and challenges. We're here to offer advice, or point in the direction of others who can.


If you're at an earlier stage we're here to help too. Maybe you're working with Christians of other traditions on a particular project, or you're finding

Support for Asylum Seekers (SAS)

Destitution Project - 2021

Awards



It seems to be the award season! It is good news to report that Asylum Link Merseyside was recently awarded the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service—this is the MBE for voluntary groups. Congratulations to them for all the fantastic work over the last twenty years by volunteers, staff and Trustees.



SAS can take some reflected glory in that we have supported financially the Destitution Project, which is delivered largely by ALM, for all those years.



Not quite as grand as an MBE but I am also privileged to have been given recently at the Anglican Cathedral the Josephine Butler Award for Volunteer of the Year 2021.

As part of that award I am able to nominate a local charity to receive £1,000. I have chosen Refugee Women Connect to receive that from the Josephine Butler Foundation. The work of RWC resonates with the incredible and selfless support and campaigning for the rights of

women and children by Josephine Butler.

Destitution Project Delivery

In 2021 our partner agencies have continued to provide practical humanitarian and wellbeing support for people seeking asylum and refuge in our local community. Where possible activities and social interaction have been made available in order to support their wellbeing and provide hope for the future.

Our main partner agencies include Asylum Link Merseyside, Refugee Women Connect, Faiths4Change, Merseyside Refugee Support Network and Action Asylum.

To read the recent SAS November Newsletter click <u>here</u>. That will provide more details about the various work and support being done throughout our network in Merseyside in 2021.

Briefly, SAS has financially supported focused and targeted projects for the destitute including:

- At St Michael in the City the 'Roots in the City – Community Garden' has been in great use by volunteers and visitors alike. There are plans for more widespread collaboration with other organisations in 2022.



The regular support that SAS

provides a reliable source of income for staff & volunteers and buys materials to help grow fresh organic vegetables and herbs for those people seeking asylum and refuge who attend the Micah Liverpool food bank at St Brides Church, Liverpool.

- At ALM the main focus has been to enable as many people as possible to have Statutory Accommodation. During the pandemic, Asylum Link Merseyside has continued to maintain contact with as many of the destitute as possible, providing outreach drops and personal contact with emergency support grants, food parcels, food vouchers, and small cash donations delivered to the hostels or hotels or known addresses for our clients. - Refugee Women Connect [formerly MRANG] has continued providing emergency support grants to their clients, many with young babies and no access to public funds or homeless or both. Section 4 applications can take a long time during which SAS financial support is their only source of income.

- Merseyside Refugee Support Network [MRSN] provides practical targeted financial support for their clients while their cases are progressed. Besides lack of funds there are many other problems in their lives which make harrowing reading.

- Action Asylum organise wonderful days out for people seeking asylum and refuge, along with members of local communities. SAS has supported them by providing protective clothing and equipment for a replanting day in Yorkshire,



a clean-up day at Crosby Beach and

removal of scrubby vegetation along a section of the Offa's Dyke Path.



Funding

Like many charity providers SAS funds have suffered because of the pandemic but we will be able to provide a slightly reduced financial



support for our partners for the next year. If anyone wants to support the

Liverpool's Good Food Plan Pledge Event





In November 2021, in collaboration with Liverpool Cathedral, Liverpool's Metropolitan Cathedral, and Together Liverpool, the Good Food Programme Network held a pledge event at Liverpool's Metropolitan Cathedral inviting organisations and residents across the city to publicly pledge their support for Liverpool's Good Food Plan.

Over 300 people attended in-person and online. Paul Beasley from BBC Radio Merseyside hosted the evening.

To mark the opening of the evening, support was pledged by Archbishop Mal-

colm McMahon for the Archdiocese of Liverpool and Bishop Paul Bayes for the Liverpool

Diocese.

Paul Beasley said, "Liverpool is a city with a big heart, and no matter how hard things get, we always come together." Canon Tony O'Brien and Very Rev Dr Sue Jones ex-



plained how the cathedrals worked together to bring the pledge evening to life.

Melisa Campbell, consultant in Public Health to Liverpool City Council, and Co-chair of Liverpool's Food Insecurity Task Force introduced the plan, why we need it and how the plan has been developed so far; "Food Insecurity has been increasing in Liverpool for the last 10 years. This isn't something that's happened as a result of the pandemic, but it has been exacerbated. What we've realised from this first phase of our work is that we probably don't fully understand the extent of food insecurity in Liverpool. There's much more work to do to recognise the full scale of what we need to address."

Liverpool Seafarers Centre Reopened

As they launched their Christmas appeal in November 2021, Ecumenical charity Liverpool Seafarers Centre (LSC) opened the doors of its centres in Crosby and Eastham for the first time since the COVID pandemic struck in March 2020.

Christmas gifts were distributed to ships calling at Merseyside ports as well as ships docking earlier in December which were at sea during the festive holiday. The annual seafarer Christmas Eve Mass took place in the chapel at its Crosby headquarters. It was the first Mass for more than 18 months celebrated by the ecumenical charity.

A big thanks goes to these men and women who have kept Britain supplied during the pandemic, often enduring extended contracts over eight months as they struggled to return home because of travel restrictions. Seafarers are still at the front line of COVID. Shore leave is often not al-

lowed, or seafarers are afraid to leave the ship for risk of catching COVID. Vaccine availability is patchy and even when it is offered the paperwork showing they have received the vaccine is not always accepted around the world. Dialogue Between Faith Communities

In Merseyside we have moved away from the old model of producing statements as a response to events unless they are local and targeted. The response to the explosion at the Women's Hospital in November was an example of a <u>press statement</u> having a significant effect in promoting calm reassurance and undermining attempts at division.

Following the strides forward we made in 2020 in local authority recognition of faith requirements around funerals and care of the deceased, 2021 has been a time when we have been able to use our networks to promote public health messages and support vaccinations. Alongside video and other communications, many faith groups have been active in assisting in vaccine roll-out, as well as modelling good practice to keep safe in the pandemic.

- Pray for the empowerment of the Spirit that we would be effective in our witness



It will be a service of Choral Vespers with the Choirs of Liverpool and Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedrals.


